- Formulating and implementing improved policies in the field of crime prevention

DEFINITION

LAUNCHED IN 2002 THE INTERNATIONAL PERMANENT OBSERVATORY ON SECURITY DURING MAJOR EVENTS (IPO) DEFINES A MAJOR EVENT as AN EVENT THAT REQUIRES INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION IN RESPECT OF ITS SECURITY PLANNING

2006/28

International Permanent Observatory on Security Measures during Major Events

The Economic and Social Council,

Recognizing the increasing importance of major events, such as large-scale sporting events, including Olympic Games, high-level summits and other mass events such as national and religious festivals,

Recognizing also the principle of freedom of assembly,

Mindful of the fact that, owing to their scale and/or high visibility, major events can be a target for unlawful activities, including for terrorism, and can be exploited by organized criminal groups for their illegal activities,

ECOSOC RESOLUTION 2006/28

Encourages Member States to strengthen their cooperation, by sharing knowledge and relevant practices on major events Security.

Invites UNICRI to continue and expand its work on major events Security providing technical assistance and advisory services to requesting Member States.

THE GLOBAL COUNTER TERRORISM STRATEGY

Encourages the United Nations to work with Member States and relevant organizations to identify and share best practices to prevent terrorist attacks on particularly vulnerable targets.

Recognizes the importance of developing public-private partnerships to identify and share best practices to prevent terrorist attacks on particularly vulnerable targets.

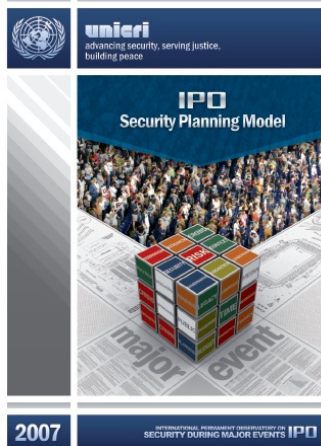

SECURITY PLANNING MODEL

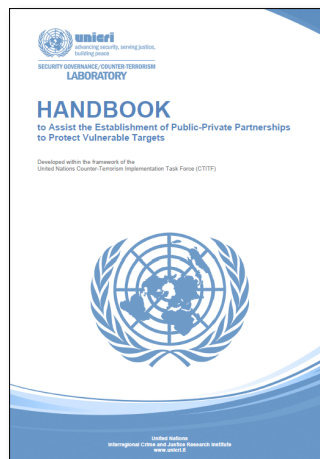
An internationally recognized security planning and post-event evaluation tool: a benchmark for Member States to assess their own major events security framework in its systematic complexity and/or in its different elements

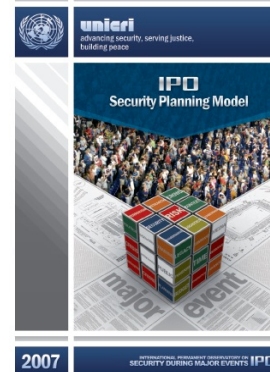
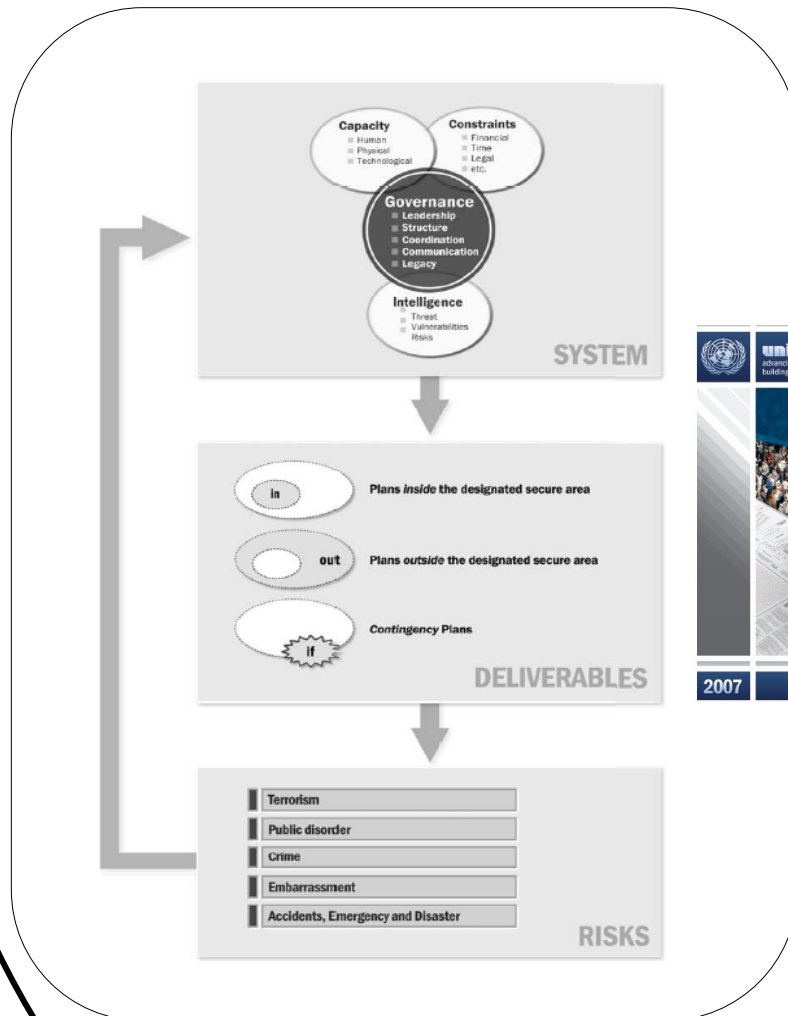
